Sermon ID - 1625 PRAYER MEETING "O WRETCHED MAN!"

Introduction

A man groaning is a moving sight: David for Absalom: Isaiah in the temple; Christ over Jerusalem. Sin has filled this world with groans.

- **1.** Paul here is groaning for deliverance he is in downright earnest. Why should he be?
 - 1) NOT because unconverted some have thought Paul's ref. is to an unconverted state (v.14). But, surely not see v.22 not the cry of an ungodly man!
 - 2) <u>NOT</u> because Paul in a <u>backslidden</u> or "defeated" state. (The argument from Rom. 8).
 - 3) <u>I understand this text to be the cry of a man whose soul is in a healthy state.</u>

<u>DOCTRINE</u>: The soul of a <u>diligent Christian</u> groans. He yearns for deliverance.

- **2.** But why should Paul, a <u>saved man + apostle</u>, groan for deliverance in this way? He is:
 - 1) delivered from his former blindness (v.9)
 - 2) delivered from condemnation (8:1)
 - 3) delivered from a <u>host of dangers</u> (2 Cor. 11)

<u>DOCTRINE</u>: A saved man may + must groan.

- **3.** The <u>deliverance</u> Paul seeks is from some thing in himself, which he experiences keenly:
 - 1) v.14: "carnal, sold under sin"
 - 2) a frustration: v.15, 18, 19, 21.
- **4.** This frustration arises because there are <u>two</u> forces / "laws" at work in his life: v.22, 23:
 - 1) One law is the Law of God: v.22
 - 2) The other is that of Sin: v.23
- **5.** Results:
 - 1) <u>frustration</u> in his desires

2) failure to do what he wishes

<u>DOCTRINE</u>: The text describes the believer in conflict with indwelling sin.

- **6.** So he cries out in <u>anguish</u> (not despair) because he laments his condition:
 - 1) He longs to be perfectly holy
 - 2) He discovers that he <u>cannot reach</u> it <u>NOTE</u>: This is a <u>perfectly healthy</u> + normal experience for a converted person. It is not "obsession with sin" / "guilt mania..."
- 7. But why should Paul so cry out? After all, he is
 - 1) saved + justified in Christ
 - 2) <u>not without full assurance</u>, as we so often read (e.g. Eph. 3:16-19) Could not Paul say, "I am saved + I can't expect to be perfect in this life"? Why this distress, this devout <u>groaning</u>?
- **8. ANSWER**: Because:
 - 1) he hated sin and hated it in himself
 - 2) he longed for <u>absolute</u> perfection

<u>APPLICATION</u>: We must never <u>condone</u> the fact that there is indwelling sin in us, as if that were a light thing.

- **9.** So, the <u>more sanctified</u> a Christian becomes the more he groans against his <u>bondage</u>, that is the experience of his own imperfection.
- **10.** When a Christian can live wholly at ease with his own sinful heart it is a sign that "the salt has lost its savour".
- **11.** But, how can the Christian get any <u>comfort</u> in this groaning state? It is in v.25: "Who <u>shall</u> deliver me?"

God, thankfully, will, when we arrive at our final state.
